# A report on the meeting of the FIS Council in Rome

At its meeting in Rome last December, the FIS Council heard a very welcome report on the progress of preparations for the XIVth Olympic Winter Games at Sarajevo in 1984.

Marc Hodler, (President of the FIS) pointed out "that the organisational preparations were going ahead extremely well and that he was very satisfied with the work of the Yugoslav organisers."

At the meeting of the Council in Rome new evidence was produced to show how the sport of skiing is growing in popularity in countries far away from the main European arenas. The Council's Vice-President, 'Mr. Yoshiro Ito (JPN) is also head of the Pacific Asian Region Organisation, which has invited competitors and officials to the "1st Pacific Cup Alpine Series" in Otaru and Sapporo (JPN), from February 13th to 19th, 1983, in connection with the Miyasama Ski Games. It is expected that competitors from Japan, China, Taipei, Korea. Australia and New Zealand will attend. The Ski Associations of the USA and Canada have also expressed their interest in the new organisation and hope to send competitors to the events.

I have said it before, but I will gladly say it again – Skiing is an international, universal sport. Its popularity has a very direct connection with the Olympic Winter Games and thus with the Olympic movement.

At the meeting in Rome, the Council confirmed its earlier decision in regard to future doping controls. Amongst other things, it was decided to adapt the FIS doping rules to those of the IOC and other IFs; to -increase considerably the number of "spot check" doping controls at international competitions and during training

periods, and to recognise all those dopetesting laboratories which have been accepted and sanctioned by the IOC.

The FIS Medical Commission, which is to be enlarged, will meet at the FIS Congress in Sydney in May 1983 to put forward the exact wording for the new FIS doping rules The committee will study the legal possibilities of blood test and the eventual inclusion of alcohol on the list of forbidden substances.

In connection with the IOC's new Eligibility Rule (No. 26), the Council unanimously decided to propose to the Congress the deletion of the current article 212.3 of the FIS Eligibility rules and to grant those skiers who have made use of the so-called "B-licence" in the past and wish to continue to use it. the permission to do so. The current FIS article 212.3 establishes that a B-licence skier "risks not being permitted to start in the Olympic Games".

There was further evidence of the development of skiing throughout the world when the following candidates for the 1965 and 1967 world championships presented their bids at the Rome meeting:

Nordic events: AUT (Seefeld), FRG (Oberstdorf). FRA (Autrans), URS (Moscow) and SWE (Falun).

Alpine events: BUL (site not announced), FRA (Briançonnais), ITA (Valtellina), SUI (Crans-Montana), SWE (Are), TCH (Jasna), USA (Aspen), and YUG (Kranjska Gora).

Before the organisers are appointed, the Congress in Sydney will make a decision on the organisation of the world championships in a year ending in an uneven number. If the proposal is accepted the present order. by which the Olympic Winter Games have' the status of the FIS Official world championships, will change.

The Council has established the following calendar for the Junior World Ski Champion-ships:

Nordic events: 1983 Kuopio (FIN), 1984 Trondheim (NOR), 1985 Taesch (SUI), 1986 Canada or USA, choice to be made between the two ski associations concerned, and 1987 Asiago (ITA).

Alpine events: 1983 Sestriere (ITA), 1984 Sugarloaf (USA), 1985 Jasna (TCH), 1986 Kleinkirchheim (AUT).

Some of the other decisions taken by the Council at its Rome meeting were:

to *confirm* its earlier decision not to sanction any World Championships for Veterans, for the time being;

to establish a "World Ranking List in the Nordic Combination" instead of a World Cup, twelve competitions during the winter of 1983 to count for the World Ranking List.

to establish the maximum length for a crosscountry ski at 230 cm, and the minimum length 180 cm, except for women and youths. Both skiis to be of exactly the same length; to set *up* FIS's own library at its new office, as from 15th March 1983. The new address is: Worbstrasse 210, Gümligen bei Bern (SUI).

The Congress has been named after the great Finnish runner, Paavo Nurmi, who was the founder of the Paavo Nurmi Foundation for Medical Research.

The aims of the congress are to acquaint coaches and doctors working in sport with the medical problems of track and field athletes; to go to know colleagues from other countries and as an introduction to the medical and service areas, competition and training sites, at the 1<sup>st</sup> World Championships in Athletics, to be held in August 1983.

The IAAF, following perhaps a lead given by the IOC, will pay the costs of three people from each IAAF member federation to the championships in Helsinki.

• Interpretation of the Corrections to the Wrestling Rules inforce from 1st January 1983:

Article 30: Evaluation of the importance of the action or hold

The "bridge lock" and its variants:

 The offensive wrestler may apply the "bridge lock" or its variants two consecutive times only.

Only the number of times that the hold is applied (maximum two consecutive times) must be taken into consideration. and not the number of technical points awarded.

After having applied the "bridge lock" a maximum of two consecutive times, the offensive wrestler must perform another action. If he does not or if there is no immediate action, the official must order that the wrestlers are placed in the standing position.

Afterwards and considering the overmentioned conditions, the offensive wrestler cannot apply the "bridge lock" as many times as he wishes.

Note: The basic principle of application of this rule is that the offensive wrestler cannot apply the "bridge lock" or its variants more than two consecutive times.

- The FILA Congress has admitted four new members: the national federations of the Popular Republic of Congo, Saudi Arabia, Upper Volta and Nigeria.
- The Federation of the German Democratic Republic, which presented the film "Lutte des Enfants" and which organised last summer the Junior European Championships, has been awarded the Diploma of Honour for these achievements.

Fédération Internationale de Nation Amateur (FINA - Swimming)



• Competitions for the Olympic Games 1984 in swimming, diving, water-polo and synchronised swimming will take place from 29th July to 12th August 1984. Information concerning competition and training sites, events, participants, and time-tables, are published in circular 49.1 from FINA.

Entries from all countries, sent through the respective National Olympic Committees, must be received by the Los Angeles Organising Committee by midnight 2nd June 1984 at the latest

Final entries bearing the names of the participants must be received by LAOOC before midnight 14th July 1984.

#### New World Record

Vladimir Salnikov (URS) has beaten his own world record in the 1500 m freestyle with a time of 14'54"76 on 22nd February 1983 in Moscow during the USSR winter swimming championships

• Seventy synchronised swimmers competed for the top ten places in the US National team in trials at the University of Arizona at Tucson. Not surprisingly, Tracie Ruiz of Bothell, Wash. was first in the trials, with Mary Visniski of Concord, Calif, second and Candy Costie, of Seattle, Wash. third. The leading ten swimmers will form the 1983 National team. What was remarkable is that included in these top ten were two sets of twins, Karen and Sarah Josephson of Bristol, Conn. and Marie and Sara White, of San Jose, Calif. It is thought to be the first time that there has been double twins on any national team.

A full programme of exhibitions throughout the United States is planned for this year, and the team will compete in the Pan American Games at Caracas, Venezuela. and the American Cup II in Los Angeles, this summer.
