It begins to look as if the other teams will have to add crowbars to their kits if they want to lift the Olympic cup. When the competition is staged ahead of the national amateur championship there is some semblance of a real contest but so far when it has been put on ahead of the western championship the result has been a foregone conclusion for the Western Golf Association team.

It has been suggested that the competition be limited to teams from state associations, but under present conditions this would make little difference as the western team has invariably been chosen from Illinois players.

In the ninth annual competition held at the Homewood Country Club, Flossmoor, Ill., on July 19, the well balanced quartet representing the Western Golf association breezed

home with a total of 628 points, which was 41 less than the score made by the Intercollegiate four, which piled up a total of 669, and took second place.

The collegiate team was a "merger" composed of two Yale, one Princeton and one Illinois player. The Wisconsin State team which included Mr. E. P. Allis, III, the Badger champion, and Mr. Gordon Yule, champion of Yale, took third place with a total of 680, and the Kentucky team was next with a grand aggregate of 730.

Owing to the withdrawal of Mr. John R. Lemist, the Trans-Mississippi team was unable to finish. Mr. Lemist, who was paired with Mr. W. K. Wood, had a lot of trouble at the 14th hole.

The field was the smallest in the history of the event and the result was a foregone conclusion for the W. G. A. team which now has won the cup six times in succession. The course was in great shape and under benign weather conditions the majority of the scores were a trifle on the high side.

Several of the holes have been lengthened and the course now is 6,283 yards in length with a par of 37 out and 38 for the home journey. The yardage is as follows:

Mr. Warren K. Wood, who is almost invincible on his home course led the field with a total of 150, Mr. Charles Evans, Jr., being second with 150.

Mr. Howard B. Lee, of Detroit, was third with 156. Mr. Wood in the morning set a competitive record for the remodeled course and had he not missed a five-foot putt on the home green he would have had a 71. Mr. Ned Allis, of Milwaukee, after a poor round in the morning had a 77 in the afternoon, after being penalized a stroke when his approach hit his caddie at the flag.

John R. Lemist of the Trans-Mississippi team withdrew during the afternoon play. Other scores on the

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Mr. Roland Harrison, of the Hyperion Field Club, of Des Moines, won the thirteenth annual championship of the Iowa State association, defeating Mr. Ralph Rider, of the same club, 2 up and 1 to play in the 36 holes final at the Des Moines Golf and Country Club on July 12.

The new champion who began playing the game seven years ago, when in high school, has by persistent effort

raised himself to the front rank of Hawkeye golfers and his new found honor is well deserved. During his passage to the championship he defeated Mr. Kenneth Lindsay, Cedar Rapids, 6 and 5, and followed by dethroning Mr. William Sheehan, the 1912 champion, to the tune of 7 and 6. Then he crossed the final bunker by downing Mr. Rider, holder of the title in 1911. Mr. Rider was runner up in the Trans-Mississippi tournament at St. Louis.

Mr. Arthur Bartlett, of the Ottumwa Club, a young player who not long ago graduated from the caddy ranks, furnished the surprise of the qualifying round in which he led a field of 150 players with a total of 154, six strokes better than the card of champion William Sheehan and eight better than the total made by Mr. Ralph Rider who had 162.

In the second half of the round Mr. Bartlett, Mr. Sheehan and Mr. Harrison each had cards of 78.

The only surprise of note in the first match round was the defeat of Mr. Warren Dickinson, champion in 1902 and 1903, by Dr. E. E. Dorr, of the Waveland Club, who won 2 and 1. Master Newman Dorr, the Waveland youngster, gave Mr. Harrison a hard battle, the coming champion being down in the early stages, but catching the boy nearing the finish, his win at the last hole enabled him to finish 2 up.

All of the leaders came through the second round with flying colors. Mr. Bartlett, of Ottumwa, and Mr. Kenneth Lindsay, of Cedar Rapids, were the only two visiting players to survive, the other six being local men.

Young Mr. Hubbell, the Des Moines high school player, eliminated Mr. Bartlett in the best match of the third round. At no time was there more than 2 holes difference between the contestants. They finished the morning round all square, each getting cards of 80. In the afternoon they were all square at the 27th hole. Mr. Hubbell took the lead at the 32nd hole and the next three were halved. He won the final hole giving him a margin of 2 up. His card was 40-38—78. Mr. Rider overwhelmed Mr. Martin by a margin of 12 and 11. Mr. Martin had the best card of the tournament, getting 38-36—74, while in the afternoon he went out in 35. A notable

feature was, that on the final hole Mr. Rider laid his opponent a stymie, and as he finished his matches against Mr. McKee and Mr. Carr in a similar manner it furnished a trinity of coincidences.

Champion Sheehan outplayed Dr. Dorr getting a card of 79 and leading 5 up at the interval, winning eventually, 8 and 7. Mr. Harrison was given a good argument by Mr. Kenneth Lindsay in the morning round.

the semi-final battle. Although the champion had a card of 38-40—78, he was 4 down at the interval. Despite a rainfall during the last nine holes Mr. Harrison had a card of 37-37—74, which is within 1 stroke of the course record. The champion was wild in the afternoon and failed to win a hole on the out round, Mr. Harrison taking three. Mr. Sheehan won the 28th hole but was defeated on the 30th green. but by the aid of a little luck he was 3 up at intermission. Mr. Harrison holed his approach on the 17th green while on Number 10 he holed a 40-foot putt and got a half. Mr. Harrison had a card of 79, Mr. Lindsay taking 82. In the afternoon Mr. Lindsay was unable to reduce the lead against him and was eliminated, 6 and 5.

Champion Sheehan by virtue of his three victories in the last four year was a favorite over Mr. Harrison in

runner up last year to Mr. Sheehan was unable to get quite as far this time, falling before the steady play of Mr. Ralph Rider, champion in 1909, who defeated the youngster 4 and 2, snuffing the last representative of the Des Moines Golf and Country Club.

Mr. Rider with a card of 41-36—77, gained an advantage of 4 up at the end of the first 18 holes. Mr. Hubbell's card was 43-40—83. At one stage in the afternoon Mr. Hubbell was 7 down but at the 27th hole he

had regained four of them. Later when Mr. Rider was dormie 6 his young opponent took three holes in a row, but on the next green the boy took three putts and Rider took the match, 4 and 2.

Mr. Rider won the first three holes of the final from Mr. Harrison and at the turn was 2 up, going out in 39 to 41 by his opponent. A stiff west wind blew across the course and made trouble for both men. Mr. Harrison won the 10th hole but dropped the 12th. Missed putts cost Mr. Rider the 14th and 15th holes making the match all square. Mr. Rider took the 16th hole 4-5, but promptly dropped this advantage, Mr. Harrison taking the next hole 3-4, the home hole was halved leaving the match all square.

The afternoon play was equally close, Mr. Harrison several times having a margin on 1 up only to have Mr. Rider get on even terms.

On the 13th green Mr. Rider missed a short putt and lost the hole, 4-3, and this mistake cut quite a lot of figure in his defeat. Mr. Harrison was the most favored by luck, winning three of his holes on stymies.

The Hyperion team won the club championship with a total of 661, the Des Moines Golf and Country Club being second with 675, and Cedar Rapids third with 707. The scores of the winning teams were: Mr. Rider, 162; Mr. Sheehan, 160; Mr. Harrison, 163; Mr. Carr, 176.

Ottumwa was voted the 1914 tournament and Mr. Dwight Baker of the Country Club promised the golfers a far better course than the one over which they played in 1909.

Miss Jessie Jones, of the Sioux City Country Club, established herself as the leading woman player of Iowa by defeating Mrs. W. F. Moore, of the Waveland Club, Des Moines, 8 and 6, in the final match for the state title at the Des Moines Golf and Country Club. The play of Miss Jones was the finest ever put up by a woman on a Des Moines course. She won six of the first nine holes, going out in 45. Miss Jones after the turn, took three holes straight with fours. In the semi-final rounds, Miss Jones defeated Miss A. Hammer, of Grandview, 6 and 4, and Mrs. Moore defeated Mrs. George McMein by a similar margin. Miss Jones had low score of 48-47—95, in the qualifying round, Miss Hammer finished second with a total of 101.

The picturesque course and the well known hospitality of the members of the Rock Island Arsenal golf club have always been a magnet for visiting players and the invitation tournament held July 9-12 attracted a field of over a hundred players, a number coming from distant points. Chicago contributed three of the best of its young players and the battle for the Colonel's cup, the main trophy of the tournament, was between two of them, Mr. Donald Edwards, of the Midlothian Country Club, defeating Mr. William I. Howland, Jr., of the Glen View Club, 1 up in the 36 holes final.

There was a lot of speculation as to the outcome of this match, but Mr. Edwards played so brilliantly in the morning he gained a lead of five holes.

His short play was almost perfect and he equaled the par of the course with a card of 74, Mr. Howland taking 78.

Mr. Howland picked up in the afternoon round, but Mr. Edwards was finally dormie 3 and although the Glen View player took the 34th and 35th holes he had to be content with a half on the home green.

Mr. Howland in the semi-final round, which was at 36 holes, disposed of the other half of the Edwards family, defeating Mr. Kenneth P. Edwards, 2 and 1, in the best match of the day. Mr. Howland gained a lead of 3 in the morning round and had a card of 77, Mr. Edwards made a game fight in the afternoon and after being 4 down he won the next three holes, putting him 1 down and 2 to go. Mr. Howland won the short "circus" hole, 3 to 4, giving him the verdict. They played the bye hole, Mr. Howland getting a medal card of 74. Donald Edwards outplayed Mr. Leon Mitchell, 7 and 6, in the other semi-final.

The three Chicago players had a close race for the qualifying medal, Mr. Kenneth P. Edwards winning from his brother and Mr. Howland by 1 shot, his card being 76.

Led by Mrs. William A. Alexander with a score of 5 up, the Exmoor Country Club, of Chicago, won the annual competition for the Higgins' trophy, played for July 1, by clubs of the Women's Western Golf Assn. The Highland Park players who were second last year, finished first, with a fine score of 8 up on par.

A question was raised as to the eligibility of Mrs. Frank G. Jones to play on the team, as she also is a member of the Memphis Country Club and there is a rule which prohibits a player from receiving credit from more than one club. As Mrs. Jones played for Exmoor in the trophy competition last year and no objections were lodged, the committee of the W. W. G. A. ruled that the Exmoor Club score would stand, but that Mrs. Jones would have to relinquish any credit she had for matches played with the Memphis Club.

The Skokie Country Club, of Chicago, which won in 1910, was second 3 up and the Los Angeles Country Club, which was first in 1911, finished third, 2 up. Mrs. Lawrence Mills, former Western champion, was 4 up, and Mrs. Frank Jones, former southern champion, was 2 up.

Mrs. J. G. Latimer, of the Homewood Country Club, of Chicago, had

the best individual score, her record of 8 up on the long course being remarkable. Par for the course is 100 and she had a medal card of 88.

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On July 15 over 500 players took part in the competitive events on five Chicago courses. The annual invitation tournament at the Skokie Country Club drew 225 players, while the women's open tournament at the Beverly Country Club had 138 starters. Twenty-eight engineers competed in a tournament at Homewood, while forty members of the Ridge Country Club took part in a "rail bird" event which started at 4 a. m. In addition to these the Hamilton Club held a golf tournament at Evanston in which nearly 100 members competed. This is a mid-week record for the Chicago district.

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Mrs. W. France Anderson, of the Hinsdale Golf Club, of Chicago, won the invitation tournament of the Tuscumbia Golf Club, Green Lake, Wis., defeating Miss Louise Fergus, of Glen View, 1 up in the final. Mrs. A. Heaning, of the Wheaton Golf Club, won the second flight from Mrs. John Worley, of Hinsdale, 2 and 1.

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Mr. John Simpson, of Galesburg,

won the amateur championship of Central Illinois by defeating Mr. Charles L. Weems, of Quincy, 11 and 9 in the final match of the tournament held at Galesburg in July under the auspices of the Central Assn. of Country Clubs of Illinois. Mr. Simpson, who is sixteen years of age, appears to be a player of great promise.

Mr. Bert Brooks, of Galesburg, took the Na Muckle Doon cup by defeating Mr. Jay Kent, of Champaign, 4 and 3.

The Galesburg team, consisting of Messrs. Simpson, Jarl, Bunker, Craig, Switzer and Miller walked away with the team match against bogey, being 51 up at the end of the 36 holes of play. The other teams finished as follows: Peoria, 3 down, Springfield, 3 down, Danville, 7 down, Bloomington, 14 down, Champaign, 10 down, Quincy 26 down, Decatur, 93 down.

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Mrs. F. S. Colburn, of the Glen View club, took the first flight honors in the Women's Western Golf Association four-day tournament at the Beverly Country Club by defeating Miss Ernestine Pearce, 3 and 2, in the final battle. Mrs. Colburn had low score of 91, the field of 138 being a record breaker for a women's event in Chicago.

In the semi-final round Mrs. Colburn won from Miss Carrie Lee, of the Evanston Golf Club of Kansas

City, 7 and 6, and Miss Pearce defeated Mrs. George S. Haskell of the home club, 3 and 2.

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After a lapse of a year the Skokie Country Club renewed its annual invitation age limit tournament, the miss having been occasioned by the burning of the club house. The tournament always has been the most popular of its kind and this time a record breaking field of 225 players—all over 30 years of age got into the fray. For the first time in the history of the event the Skokie cup was

won by a home-player, Dr. Lee K Stewart taking Mr.

Leon A. Wolters into camp in the final match, 7 and 5, at 36 holes. The big doctor played consistently and as Wolters was off on his short game the Skokie man had a lead of 2 up at the end of the morning play. On the first six holes in the afternoon round the doctor played par golf and led 6 up, never being in danger.

Walter E. Egan, of the Exmore

Country Club, former western champion, had low score in the qualifying round, his card of 79 being 3 over par. Mr. Egan was generally picked to win in spite of the fact that he has had but little match practice this year. He won his first match from Mr. W. F. Workman, of Springfield, Ill., but in the second round was unexpectedly eliminated by Mr. William H. Bennett, one of the

Should both of them be disqualified, the city title would revert to Mr. Blaine Young, who had a total of 496.

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Mr. George M. Coon is the prosecuting attorney of Grant County, and played in the Indiana State tournament at Muncie. 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As we go to press, the Western amateur championship, which is being played at Homewood, has reached the semi-final stage. The semi-finalists are: Mr. Ned Allis, Milwaukee; Mr. Robert A. Gardner, Hinsdale; Mr. Warren K. Wood, Homewood, and Mr. J. C. Le Duc, Calumet.

Mr. Allis put Mr. Charles Evans, Jr., the title holder, out in the penultimate round by 4 up and 3 to play.
